Jack Buck is a life-long Winnetka resident. A graduate of New Trier, Notre Dame, and University of Chicago Business School, Jack is Senior Vice President in the Development Group for the John Buck Company. His career has given him broad experience in real estate development, from project design and financing, through the construction process, to building leasing and management. His responsibilities have also included working with public bodies on zoning and land use issues. The John Buck Company is a member of the U.S. Green Building Council, applying sustainability building methods to new construction and redevelopment.

In addition, Buck is involved with efforts to support quality educational opportunities for low-income students in Chicago through Big Shoulders Foundation, Freedom to Learn, and the John Buck Foundation; as well as the Economics Club of Chicago. The Bucks have four children in middle and high school.

In Buck's application, he stated his purpose in seeking a Trustee position is that

“...I am very interested in ensuring that our Village continues its tradition of non-partisan self-government. No matter what an individual's beliefs are, Winnetka has been and should be a diverse and accepting community. If chosen to represent the citizens of Winnetka, I will work hard to ensure that all voices and opinions are heard...If I am selected, I will strive to ensure future generations enjoy the wonderful amenities I enjoyed growing up here.”

Patrick Corrigan has been a resident of Winnetka for 12 years; but a native of the Chicagoland area. A graduate of University of Wisconsin-Madison, he earned a Masters of Management in Finance and Marketing from the Kellogg Graduate School at Northwestern University. He is an independent real estate developer, focusing primarily on retail and medical office buildings. He previously worked with the Trammel Crow Company, the Daly Group, and Hamilton Partners.

He and his wife, Jenny (who grew up in Winnetka), have three children: one at Washburne, one at New Trier, and one in college. He is a Trustee of the Chicago Academy of Science, a Trustee of the Maybrook Foundation, founding member and past President of the Chicago Community Trust's Young Leaders Forum, an Officer of the United Charities Metropolitan Board, a Director of the Northwest Chicago Redevelopment Corporation and a Board Member of the Chicago Real Estate Awards Dinner. Locally, he has been on the vestry at Christ Church and coached Winnetka house league hockey, soccer and basketball teams.

Corrigan's application for candidacy outlines the skills he has developed over his career that he believes will be of service to the community:

“I...understand what is needed for successful development. I also have strong project, budgeting, management financing skills.

“I have a very sharp pencil when it comes to costs.

“I have worked with over 80 different local governments during my career and could bring ideas for best practices to Winnetka.

“...I have the ability to communicate issues not only to government officials but also to all community members.”

In closing, Corrigan indicated a concern that “raising taxes and fees is putting a burden on many families who are finding it too expensive to live in our community”, and is interested in containing and reducing “costs of operations and projects without affecting services.”

Stuart McCrary is a 21 year resident of Winnetka, coming out of Northwestern's undergraduate program and the Kellogg Graduate School of Management , and holds a CFA (Chartered Financial Analyst). He has worked for Coamerica Bank, the Securities Group, CS First Boston, Fenchurch Capital Management hedge fund, and started a hedge fund for Frontier Asset Management. He currently does economic consulting for Navigant (formerly Chicago Partners).

McCrary has also been an adjunct professor teaching on financial topics for IIT and DePaul, and currently teaches Accounting at Kellogg School of Management. He has also written textbooks on both accounting and finance.

The McCrarys have three children:, one at New Trier, one in college, and a recent graduate. He has been involved in the community in several ways. Through music - singing in the Kenilworth Union choir; playing in the Skokie-Washburne benefit pit band, in Memorial Day parades, and in a garage band that does charity functions. Through his children - exemplified by serving as Tribal and Nation chief for the Indian Princesses Program, McGaw YMCA. And through the community – for example, as a liaison with A Just Harvest Soup Kitchen, and on the Winnetka Caucus, as the treasurer in his second year.

In his written statement about his interest in serving on the Village Council, McCrary says,

“I am interested in giving back to the community...I am interested in the important questions facing the town right now...

“I have spent the last eleven years in a consulting practice that requires me to review complex business decisions. I would bring to the Council an ability to incorporate many factors into an analysis of the questions before the Council, to weigh conflicting factors, and to focus on the key issues that affect the decisions before the Council.”
